FOLLOW-UP REPORT ON W.U.S.

During the World University Service campaign, campus interest is WUS was evident. Now, however, some pledges remain unpaid and a few may not know how or where there money was used.

Students and faculty pledged \$3100 to WUS of which \$2800 has been paid to date. It is not too late to submit unpaid pledges to the C.A. office in the Carnegie Building.

Of the total collected, \$1200 has been assigned for four international scholarships here at Bucknell. \$500 has been sent to the University of Rangoon for scholarship use there. The balance has been sent to the National WUS organization and earmarked for specific aid to the Madras Health Center in India.

The WUS organization on campus is being reorganized this spring under the direction of Dawn Beatty, Chairman of World Relatedness.
