## ATTENTION TO CIVIL RIGHTS

One of the main concerns this fall of the Cabinet and Board of the Christian Association has been some responsible relationship to the Civil and Human Rights crises.

Mrs. Elizabeth McLaughlin, Chairman of the Board, called together in October a group of members of the faculty and student body to explore the situation. As a consequence, Dr. Robert E. Martin, Professor of Government at Howard University, was invited to meet with interested persons on Saturday afternoon, December 7.

Both Dr. Martin and Dr. Samuel Proctor, who was on campus the same day, met with about 30 interested people. Specific suggestions for action came from the session. These included working with the American Council on Education to establish a working relationship with a Negro college in the South for student and faculty exchange, for the purpose of upgrading education there and sensitizing ourselves to the other needs. Dr. Martin also suggested that the group might wish to associate itself with the Urban League, which has a broad program of cultural development.

Discussions will be carried further, and later in the year Dr. Martin will present a series of lectures on campus on this history and present status of civil rights in the American scene.
