

Discrimination Caused By Economics Says Simpson At Soc Club Meeting

Frank T. Simpson, executive secretary of the Connecticut Inter-Racial Commission, addressed the members of the Sociology Club at an open meeting in the Commerce and Finance building last night.

In his talk he asserted that principle causes of discrimination and prejudice can be traced to economic factors, although many influences are involved.

In dealing with group tensions Mr. Simpson stressed the superior method of using techniques dealing with concrete situations rather than merely fomenting good will.

Mr. Simpson, who is the author of such works as, "New Waves of Negro Migration," "A Study of the Ameri-



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can Missionary Association Schools and Colleges," and "The Negro in Connecticut," has for many years been an active worker for the advancement of inter-racial harmony. Besides his vital work on the Inter-Racial Commission, Mr. Simpson has held such important positions as field agent for the Congregational Extension Society, field agent for the American Missionary Association for its Negro Colleges, and public opinion analyst.

In addition to his address before the Sociology Club, Mr. Simpson has been guest speaker during the week in several classes in both sociology and political science. Tonight at 8:00, following a dinner given in his honor, he will speak before a joint meeting of the NAACP and the IRC in the Commerce and Finance Building.

Mr. Simpson, who was accompanied by his wife, will remain in Lewisburg until Saturday when they will return to Hartford.

Women Leaders Laud Honor Plan
