Jane Edna Hunter, well-known figure in Cleveland social work, will address the 9:30 Class Sunday morning on the subject "My Father in God and Humanity."

Making a second appearance as guest speaker at the Sunday Evening Forum, Miss Hunter will discuss how other people have helped her in building better race relations in her address, "Strengthening Democracy".

Born the daughter of an emancipated slave in Pendleton, South Carolina, Jane Hunter is best known as founder of the Phillis Wheatley Association in Cleveland. Named for a Negro slave girl who became a great poet, the Phillis Wheatley Association was founded in 1911 for the benefit of the Cleveland working girl.

Active In Racial Relations

Besides her work in the Phillis Wheatley Organization, Jane Hunter is an active member of the following organizations: National Association of Social Work, National Association of Colored Women, American Association of Social Workers, and was past president of the Ohio State Federation of Colored Women's Clubs. Miss Hunter is the author of "A Nickel and a Prayer", the story of her life and work.

The Cleveland News said of Miss Hunter, "... the greatest friend in Cleveland of the colored working girl."
